OVCI la Nostra Famiglia

The Volunteers' Organization for International Co-operation OVCI - la Nostra Famiglia was founded in Como, Italy, in 1982, with the aim of setting-up initiatives to improve the human, social, technical and medical aspects of developing countries, as well as of promoting the development and autonomy of the people, with particular attention to the integration and rehabilitation of the children with disability.

The priority of OVCI is the prevention, the care and rehabilitation of children affected by physical, developmental or sensorial disabilities.

OVCI has been working in South Sudan since 1983, upon request of the Juba Catholic Archdiocese, setting up a Pediatric Polyvalent Centre called Usratuna Rehabilitation Centre.

Commitments in South Sudan

OVCI has been present in South Sudan since 1983 to carry out basic health, education and rehabilitation activities for people with disabilities, with a special focus on the age of development.

OVCI in South Sudan is committed in:

- 1. Rehabilitation services through the management of a Rehabilitation Centre, an Orthopaedic Workshop and the promotion of surgical interventions in Uganda for children with disabilities.
- 2. Primary Care Health services, through the management of a PHCC, excellence in the treatment of epilepsy, and a nutritional programme for ante-natal and post-natal care.
- 3. Community-based Inclusive Development (CBID) program aimed at enhancing inclusivity of children and adults with disabilities in the South Sudanese society.
- 4. Inclusive Education program, through a pre-school for children with impairments and activities targeting public schools.

5. University services development, by collaborating in the management of the degree course in Rehabilitation Sciences and Human Development Sciences at St. Mary's College.

Background Disability in South Sudan

Decades of conflict in South Sudan, pre and post-independence in 2011, poverty and poor access to services have increased the rate of disability and have increased the marginalization and the exclusion of people with disability, as a result of the several attitudinal, environmental, and institutional barriers they face, and of the lack of concerted efforts towards inclusion at governmental and at community level. People with disabilities are heavily represented among the poorest and most inactive and unemployed in South Sudan.

Disability has been among the most neglected sectors within the South Sudanese health system, featured by a lack of dedicated facilities and skilled manpower. The estimated global percentage of people with disabilities (15%) can be tailored to the country, worsened by the conflicts and the extremely volatile environment severely affecting the quality of life of the people. Reliable data about disability prevalence in the country are not available: the 2008 census indicated Persons with Disability as 5,1% of the population, more recent papers acknowledge disability prevalence around 11% of the total population (OVCI, 2017; Legge, 2016).

Project Overview

The project develops from CBM funded MYP (P3805) "Community Based Inclusive development in Juba-Promotion of Human Rights and Access to Services for Persons with Disabilities", which is itself the continuation of a CBR program started in 2007.

The evolution of Community-Based Rehabilitation (CBR) is the **Community-Based Inclusive Development (CBID)**, which seeks to remove barriers and promote social change and inclusion, medical care and rehabilitation, ensuring People with Disabilities to have equal access, along with all other members of society, to rehabilitation and other services and opportunities including health, education and income. Furthermore, the process aims at ensuring that People with Disabilities are able to maximize their physical and mental abilities, and to become active contributors to the community and society development, without discrimination.

CBID is both a method and a framework for how to organize and safeguard the rights of People with Disabilities, and is considered the main tool for implementation of the UNCRPD

in supporting the development of one's full potential with control over factors that shapes

his/her life, contributing to the development of the entire society.

The 4200-MYP CBID Project is in line with the CBR Matrix developed by WHO, where core

components and elements are identified in order to develop a strategy to promote the

rights of persons with disability. The main components are: Health, Education, Livelihood,

Social and Empowerment. The CBID Project strategy will focus on these components in

accordance to OVCI Expertise, history and needs of the target group in Juba, where

inequitable access to education, employment, health care, social and legal systems, push

them into a high risk of exclusion.

Specific Goal

People with disabilities are able to access the health and rehabilitation services, education and livelihood opportunities as other members of the community.

Area of intervention or Results

- 1. Awareness on Disability and Inclusion
- 2. Network to increase access to **health** and **rehabilitation** services
- 3. People with disability have improved **mobility**.
- 4. **Inclusive education** promoted within target schools
- 5. Improved access to **livelihood** opportunities for people with disabilities and their families.

Objective of the Data Collection Tools Set Up Consultancy

The 4200-MYP CBID target a wide range of clients with and without disabilities linked with OVCI - Usratuna Rehabilitation Centre and other external services/facilities.

In order to effectively monitor and evaluate the CBID project progress and achievements, OVCI intends to renew and design the data collection and analysis tools, which can adequately record all the services the CBID project provide to the beneficiaries and align with CBR/CBID international standards and indicators.

The aim of the tools set-up is therefore to revise the project collecting data system, by ensuring data are registered in the most accessible, efficient and effective way in order to be compliant with CBM reporting requirements, while aligning with OVCI South Sudan CBID program monitoring and evaluation needs.

Furthermore, as OVCI, through the Usratuna Centre management, provides multiple health/rehabilitation/nutrition services, an internal referral system is in place in order to ensure the smoothest disposal of beneficiaries. The referral system includes the CBID department, since the project beneficiaries are often referred from and to the rehab/health services.

The consultant, will update and document the referral system accordingly with the requirements set by the Usratuna Centre services.

The set-up phase includes training OVCI - CBID staff in order for them to be able to use the tools and properly implement the referral system.

Methodology

The data tools will be re-designed on the basis of the tools used during the previous CBID project 3805-MYP, closed in December 2021.

The consultant will be provided with the current data tools and the structure of the project, including activities and indicators specific for the CBR/CBID approach implementation. OVCI will provide more details on what is needed to be reviewed, accordingly to the project documentation needs and the M&E system aims. Relevant staff will be involved and/or interviewed by the consultant when needed.

The consultant will revise all the current data tools, ensuring that the relevant data request by CBM and OVCI are collected properly and in a user-friendly manner.

The referral system procedure will be revised and properly descripted. It will be crucial to ensure the referral flow is easily trackable, in order for OVCI-CBID to adequately support the M&E system.

It will follow a brief training for the relevant staff in order to ensure a qualitative implementation of the data tools management.

Kev deliverables

The consultant is required to deliver the following as per the agreed timeframe:

- 1) Data collection tools and database updated or designed *ex-novo* accordingly to the CBID 4200 MYP indicator's compliance requirements.
- 2) OVCI CBID Referral System procedure revised, established and adequately descripted.
- 3) Brief training to relevant OVCI CBID staff on data tools management and referral system qualitative and timely implementation.

All outputs will be delivered in soft copy.

All outputs will be submitted in English.
