Project background and Oxfam	 Oxfam has been working in South Sudan since 1983. Our Programmatic Strategy concentrates on saving lives, Resilient Livelihoods, Advancing Gender Justice and Good Governance and Active Citizenship through a full spectrum platform that includes humanitarian response, recovery and resilience, long term development and policy and advocacy some of the respond are implemented in partnership with NNGO's. Oxfam currently operates via five area field offices in South Sudan Oxfam in South Sudan with funding from SIDA will be implementing 4 years integrated project titled Building resilience through gender and conflict sensitive approaches to education, skills development, and sustainable livelihoods in South Sudan. The objective of the project is to strengthen resilience through access to education, skills development and improving livelihoods and a strong focus on targeting girls and women, particularly vulnerable groups in South Sudan, the intervention aims to contribute towards Outcome 1: Conflict-affected adolescents, youth, women and men have improved knowledge and skills through safe, quality and gender responsive education and skills development and Outcome 2: Strengthened inclusive participation and gender responsive local leadership to ensure resilient education systems and sustainable livelihoods. It also contributes to key objectives under Sweden's Strategy for Development Cooperation with South Sudan for 2018 – 2022, namely: 1) peaceful and inclusive societies, and 2) basic public services and livelihood opportunities.
Problem statement	 In South Sudan 2 of 3 youth aged between 15-24 years have entered the labour market in which a total of 60% are engaged in substance farming and rearing animals. Of the total population aged between (15-24) years, 58% percent are employed in non-wage work in the agriculture sector (World Bank October 2020) 82% of the population in South Sudan is poor according to the most recent estimates, based on the below \$1.90 a day (World Bank 2011) Purchasing Power Parity Poverty Line. The 82% Agricultural workforce in South Sudan has additional layer of vulnerability which is the low literacy rate with Gender Parity Index of 0.98 in favour of boys.
Scope and dimension of the assessment	The assessment is aim at profiling viable livelihoods options for youth and women including life skills training, feasible income generation activities and understanding the market dynamics to ensure that the programme is tailored to meet the needs for skill development, alternative income sources based on better understanding of markets to achieve an inclusive socio-economic development among the rural poor youth and women. The dimension of the assessment will cover the following areas.
